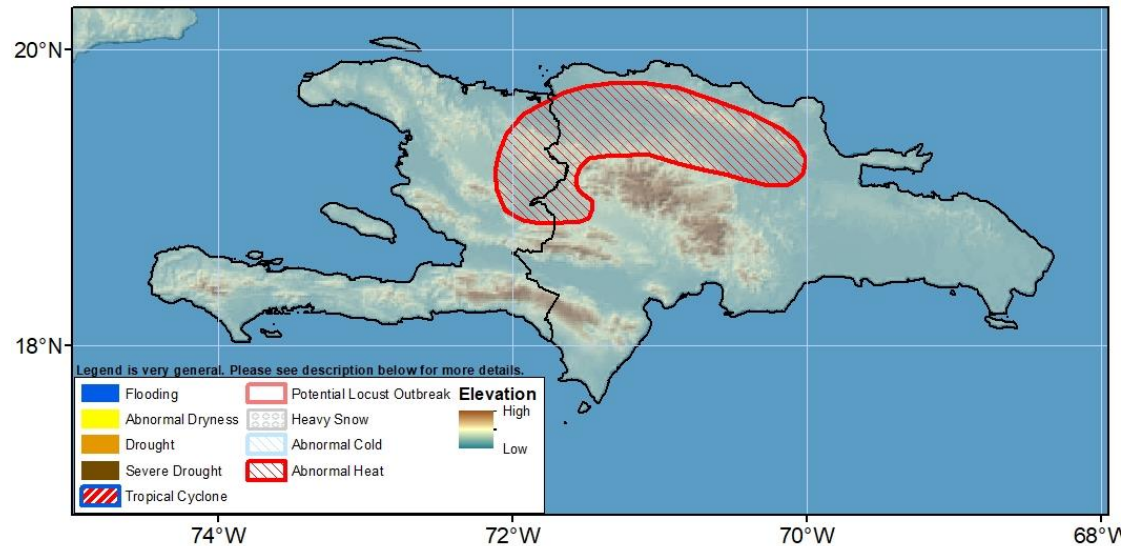


## Climate Prediction Center's Hispaniola Hazards Outlook For USAID / FEWS-NET 14 March – 20 March 2024

Little rain was observed across the island during the last week



During the past week, a little light rain was observed across the island. A few scattered showers (totaling less than 10 mm) were observed primarily in coastal regions, while the island's interior remained mostly dry. Despite the paucity of rain, early March is typically dry, so little in the way of anomalies resulted. Over the past 30 days, Hispaniola experienced mostly near-average or below average conditions – showing a drying trend in the last couple of weeks. Central Dominican Republic and central/southern Haiti registered small negative anomalies, while some surpluses are present along the northern and southern Dominican Republic coasts. Consequently, vegetation conditions were mixed in Hispaniola. The poorest NDVI values indicating poor vegetation health are found in eastern Dominican Republic, while vegetation was healthy in southwestern Dominican Republic, northwestern and southern Haiti.

During the next week, light rainfall is forecast in across the island. 7-day rainfall totals are expected to be around 5-25 mm in eastern Dominican Republic and 2-5 mm elsewhere. The forecast rainfall is slightly drier than is typical for mid-March in Hispaniola.

**Note:** The Hazards outlook map is based on current weather/climate information, short and medium-range weather forecasts (up to 1 week), sub-seasonal forecasts up to 4 weeks, and assesses the potential impact of extreme events on crop and pasture conditions. Shaded polygons are added in areas where anomalous conditions have been observed and predicted to continue during the outlook period. The boundaries of these polygons are only approximate at the spatial scale of the map. This product takes into account long-range seasonal climate forecasts but does not reflect current or projected food security conditions.
